





About today's Music

Gottes Sohn ist kommen - The prelude and postlude this morning are based upon our processional hymn. Historically, this chorale was used for Advent and many composers wrote settings to it. The chorale or hymn melody is used as a *cantus firmus* that is simply, where a preexistent melody is used that forms the basis of a larger musical work. The *cantus firmus* is traditionally played on the pedals with a reed stop.

The translated text states:

1. God's son has come for the good of us all to this earth in humble features so that he may free us and loose us from sin.
2. He also comes still today and teaches the people how to turn from sin to repentance, to walk from error and foolishness into truth.
3. Those who are not ashamed of him, and who accept his service with true faith and complete trust, these, he will forgive their sins.

The Mass of St. Hugh by Healey Willan

James Healey Willan (1880 – 1968) was an Anglo-Canadian organist and composer. Born at Balham [London], England, Willan was a dominant figure in Canadian musical life for over half a century, influencing several generations of composers, organists, choir directors, singers and audiences through his teaching and example. After immigrating to Canada in 1913 he taught at the Toronto Conservatory (1913-36) and U of Toronto (1937-50). From 1921 until his death he was organist-choirmaster of the Anglican Church of St Mary Magdalene, Toronto. Apparently uninfluenced by musical innovations of the times, Willan's compositions reflect variously the enthusiasms of his boyhood and training in Anglo-Catholic liturgy, choral music of Tudor and contemporary English masters and the rich romanticism of Brahms and Wagner. He composed more than 800 works including operas, symphonies, chamber music, a concerto, and pieces for band, orchestra, organ, and piano. He is best known for his church music. The **Mass of St. Hugh** which the St. Luke's choir will sing this Advent is a fine example of several mass setting he composed for small choirs.

Christian Education and Formation

► **Intergenerational: Pilgrimage to the Palestine of Jesus:** On Sunday, December 4th following coffee hour (approx.. 12:45PM), Mother Barnes and Mother Liz will offer a presentation at St. Luke's on their recent study pilgrimage to Jerusalem and their course at St. George's College. The program will include photos and stories from their trip and insights into the landscapes and narratives of Jesus and the three Abrahamic faiths that share this common region. The presentation will also be offered at St. Paul's, Montrose on Sunday, December 11 at 1:00PM.

► Children and Youth

Resources for Children: We have new welcome bags for our youngest attendees to enjoy during Mass. The bags are filled with sensory engaging toys and books and are available from an usher. Weekly lectionary materials are also available for our youngest members and visitors.

Sunday School: St. Luke's uses the **GODLY PLAY**, a Montessori-based curriculum with our younger children, ages five to ten years old. Sunday School is held at 9:30 AM every Sunday, except the first Sunday of the month.

Youth Confirmation Class – Our Youth Confirmation program is underway, with the launch of our yearlong confirmation program for our youth (ages 11-16) having been on Oct. 2 at 4PM in Kreitler Hall. We will be meeting monthly on the first Sunday of each month, October 2022 –May 2023. We are using the book, “My Faith, My Life”, a Teen’s Guide to the Episcopal Church. This program will preparation our older youth for confirmation next June. Participants can sign up to receive this daily message, in English and Spanish, by email or by following AdventWord on social media.


