THE WORD of the LORD came to me: What do you mean by repeating this proverb concerning the land of Israel, "The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge"? WHEN JESUS entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching, and said, "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" ►Youth


This fall we will continue in the momentum of our Youth Confirmation Program and offer *Journey to Adulthood* (J2A) a youth ministry program of spiritual formation for 6th-12th grades. Fully revised and updated, it is centered on inclusive, relational ministry and uses Bible study, prayer, rites of passage, and outreach ministries. Creative, developmentally appropriate lessons are arranged within three categories of Self, Society, and Spirituality. For the benefit of our youth who have just been confirmed, we will use the **4Ward** cohort of J2A which is an inclusive, engaging, relational youth ministry program in a two-year cohort for ages 15.18, concluding with the 4Ward garemony. Special Holy Hike for the Season of Creation – On Sunday, October 1, 2023 at 3pm there will be a special Holy Hike in celebration of the Season of

Creation. We will meet at the Lackawanna Heritage Valley Trailhead on Elm Street and walk towards Taylor. This section of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail, is home to "Ohn Te Oak" ("Where

they fish"), which was once a Native American fishing village and Haudenosaunee diplomacy trail from the Wyoming Valley through the Lackawanna Valley and north to Syracuse. This corridor is now a popular section of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail that pays homage to the indigenous peoples who long ago recognized the site's natural beauty and potential as a travel route.

Diocesan Convention this year will be a two-day, in-person event on **October 13 and October 14, 2023**, at the Centennial Conference Center in Center Valley, PA.

Friday evening will include a diocesan worship service followed by dinner, featuring Bishop Clarence Bester, Bishop of Wangaratta from the Anglican Church of Australia. We will begin gathering at 4:30 p.m., with worship beginning at 5:30 p.m. and dinner beginning at 7:00 p.m.

Saturday will include the business portion of Diocesan Convention for canonical clergy, elected convention delegates, and alternates. Check-in will begin at 9:00 a.m. with the hope of convention being called to order at 10:00 a.m. and finishing before 3:00 p.m.

St. Luke's church complies with all HIPAA requirements and cannot provide personal information for sick or injured members without permission of the member or his or her close family member. Additionally, if you or a loved one are hospitalized or homebound and desire regular Eucharistic visitation, please notify the parish office. Eucharistic Visitations are customarily made once per month; weekly visits may be scheduled upon request.



October 1, 2023 – Pentecost 18 (A) Evangelism Grants

Episcopal institutions are invited to apply for evangelism grants to support local and regional efforts to grow Episcopal ministries, resources, and gatherings. The application deadline is Oct. 13.

The grant application, criteria, requirements, budget information, and more are available online in English, Spanish, and French: https://iam.ec/evangelismgrants.

The grants committee will consider proposals for up to \$2,000 for individual faith communities and up to \$8,000 for multichurch, diocesan, provincial, and other regional collaborations. A total of \$125,000 is available for this funding cycle.

The 2023 grant focus is on evangelism initiatives that minister across barriers. Projects that would fit this theme include the following:

- Collaborative, lay-led ministries that are not clergy dependent.
- Ministries that explicitly support and include communities traditionally underrepresented in The Episcopal Church.
- Ministries that engage new ways of being the church in new spaces.

"Presiding Bishop Michael Curry has noted that evangelism is not about building bigger churches but rather about building a better world," said Jerusalem Greer, manager of evangelism and discipleship. "The same is true for this evangelism grant cycle; we are looking for applicants and projects committed to sharing the Good News of God in Christ in ways that build relationships, heal brokenness, and invite people to create a better world together."



The Episcopal Evangelism grants program began in 2017 in response to the 2015 General Convention's increased investment in evangelism. The program is coordinated by the Executive Council Joint Standing Committee on Mission Within The Episcopal Church in collaboration with evangelism staff. During the 2018-2 021 triennium, 12 Episcopal communities were awarded grants, out of 59 applicants.

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DEAN JULIA Trinity Cathedral has a long history of welcoming Latino worshippers, but I feel like we still have so much to learn about being stewards of our community's diversity.

CANON FILEMÓN Yes, being rooted in abundance means caring for the whole tree. Not just the visible parts, but also the roots. It's not enough to just see Latino people in church. We need to understand what's going on with them at a deeper level. In Latino ministry, caring for the roots comes through deep listening, and the abundance of our hospitality.

CANON FILEMÓN Abundance is a blessing. I can never give enough to God. Whatever I give, God gives more. The tree of life is a very powerful image for us. When God is present in our lives, our roots are deep, and we have more to give.

DEAN JULIA I hope that we can learn to recognize abundance and practice generosity even when we don't see or feel it. Trees have an extraordinary resiliency for bearing fruit in good times and in hard times.

CANON FILEMÓN Agreed, and—as a gardener—I also know that an abundance of fruit is subject to rot or pests if it's not shared.

DEAN JULIA We're in what we call stewardship season in most of our English-speaking churches. I like that term when we talk about our care for relationships or for the earth and its trees, but I'm not always convinced that stewardship is the best word for church fundraising.

CANON FILEMÓN It's actually a problematic term in Spanish because it means something like "power over others" rather than "care for others." I prefer to talk about making promises (promesas), which implies a mutuality of relationship.

DEAN JULIA Like the roots of trees, our promises to our each other, within diverse communities, allow us to share abundance with each other. | 188,400

Questions for Reflection:

Imagine you have a fruit tree in your garden or yard. Assuming you don't keep all the fruit for yourself, how would you handle an abundance of fruit? Within the metaphor of stewardship, would you give away the best fruit, picked fresh? The fruit that falls to the ground but is still good? Or the leftovers after you have picked what you wanted?


